

International Women's Day
Inspirational Women Across Subjects

2023

Celebrated on the 8th of March, International Women's Day celebrates women and the achievements they have made throughout history until the present day. The day signifies the changes that have been made, taking steps toward a future where gender equality is finally met, as well as shining a light on those who may have been overlooked by history. Today, we are highlighting some of the most influential women in history, as well as some lesser known heroes, and relate them to the school subjects you practise every day.

### Maths & Science:

**Katherine Johnson:** Katherine Johnson was a NASA mathematician who played a pivotal role in creating solutions to send astronauts into space as well as calculating the trajectory that would be needed to send Apollo 11 into space. In 1952 Johnson joined NACA as a 'Computer' solving complicated equations, Johnson was curious and overcame many gender and racial boundaries in order to gain a higher position, which made her the first woman in her division to be credited on a report. She retired in 1986 after a long career of invaluable work.

Mary Anning: After her brother found a strange skull, 12 year old Mary Anning went down to the same beach to search for and dig up the rest of the Ichthyosaur skeleton. Throughout her life Mary also discovered a Plesiosaurus, Pterodactyl as well as many other smaller fossils. Often shunned by the scientific community, Anning was not recognised fully for her work until many years after her death.

### English:

Maya Angelou: Writer and poet Maya Angelou was born in 1928. Throughout her life she worked for Malcom X and Dr. Martin Luther King as a civil rights activist. She was also a singer, dancer, actress and the first black female Hollywood director. Angelou wrote 6 autobiographies in her lifetime as well as poetry, her most famous book, 'I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings,' was immediately successful and nominated for a National Book Award.

**Concepción Arenal:** Concepción Arenal was a Spanish writer, poet and journalist. In the year 1841, she became the first woman to attend university in Spain. In the following years, Arenal would found a newspaper with her husband, as well as a feminist group devoted to helping the poor.

### The Arts:

**Frida Kahlo:** Frida Kahlo was a Mexican artist and painter who created over 200 artworks during her life. Many of them are self portraits, which reflect the emotional and physical pain she faced, throughout her tumultuous relationship with her husband as well as the injuries she suffered after a nearly fatal bus crash. Most of Kahlo's success was achieved after her death in 1954, with most of her art selling for millions nowadays.

Michelle Yeoh: After decades in the film industry, Michelle Yeoh recently made history as being the first asian woman to win the 'Best Actress' award at the Oscars, for her film, Everything Everywhere All At Once. Saying in her speech, 'Ladies, don't let anybody tell you you are ever past your prime.'

Kate Bush: With hit songs 'Wuthering Heights' 'Running up that Hill' and 'Babooshka,' Kate Bush's unique whimsical musical and dance style renders her a very distinctive musical figure, her influence can be seen in the industry even now, more than 45 years after her debut.

### **Humanities:**

**Junko Tabei:** In 1975, Junko Tabei became the first woman to climb Mount Everest along with her climbing group of 15 other women. After conquering Everest, Tabei went on to complete The Seven Summits, finally completing her journey in 1992 after climbing Carstensz Pyramid in Indonesia.

Malala Yousafzai: After surviving an assassination attempt at the age of 15 due to speaking out about the bans on women's education in Pakistan, Malala Yousafzai became recognised around the world for her activism. In 2014 she became the youngest person to receive a Nobel Prize at just 17. Yousafzai has published many books and continues to be an inspiration to people all over the world.
